# Invitation to host future World Scout Events

The World Scout Committee presents to the 43<sup>rd</sup> World Scout Conference the Member Organizations accepted to bid for the future World Scout Events.

<b>Conference proposal:</b>	Votes on invitation to host future World Scout Events
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A brief explanation about the process for bidding for World Scout Events is followed by brief overviews of each bid for the 44<sup>th</sup> World Scout Conference (2027), 17<sup>th</sup> World Scout Moot (2029) and 27<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree (2031). Member Organizations should familiarise themselves with the details of these bids and contact the concerned Member Organizations directly for further information or clarifications.

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### Languages

*The official languages of WOSM are English and French. The World Scout Bureau will make all Conference Documents available in both languages. When possible, it endeavours to also make them available in Arabic and Spanish. In the event of a conflict arising out of the interpretation of this Conference Document or any other official document of WOSM, the English text will prevail.*

## Invitation to host future World Scout Events

A World Scout Event is hosted by a Member Organization or alliance of Member Organizations (“the Host”) on behalf of WOSM. All WOSM Member Organizations in good standing can extend invitations (a “bid”) to the Conference to host a particular World Scout Event.

In November 2022, [Circular No. GLB-C26-2022](#) called for invitations from Member Organizations to host the future World Scout Events. The circular indicated that the deadline for receiving intentions to bid was 31 July 2023.

Each Member Organization that bids to host a World Scout Event is required to undertake an extensive due diligence process implemented by the World Scout Bureau, ensuring they are ready and have the capacity to host such a World Scout Event. The Member Organizations were also informed about the official WOSM guidelines and requirements for hosting these events.

The results of the due diligence process were reviewed by the World Scout Committee to determine which Member Organizations were to be accepted to put forward their bid during the Conference.

The Host of each event is appointed by the Conference multiple years in advance to allow adequate time for planning and promotion. The 43<sup>rd</sup> World Scout Conference will decide on the Hosts of the following World Scout Events:

- 44<sup>th</sup> World Scout Conference (2027)
- 17<sup>th</sup> World Scout Moot (2029)
- 27<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree (2031)

Basic information about the bids to host these future events appear on the following pages. More details will be available from the bidding Member Organizations themselves.

### IMPORTANT REMINDER

Through the bidding process, all bidding Member Organizations are required to abide by the [WOSM Code of Conduct for bidders for World Events](#). Those bidding as an alliance need to follow the [Guidelines for Alliances in World Events](#) to ensure a fair and equal decision-making process is carried out and aligned with Scouting’s values.

## 44th World Scout Conference (2027)

The [World Scout Conference](#) is the governing body of the World Organization of the Scout Movement. Taking place every three years, the Conference enables WOSM's Member Organizations to play an active role in shaping the standards, policies and shared goals of the Scout Movement worldwide.

The World Scout Committee approved to bring before the Conference the following Member Organizations to bid for the 44<sup>th</sup> World Scout Conference (2027):

- Rwanda – Rwanda Scouts Association
- United Kingdom – The Scout Association

## Rwanda – Rwanda Scouts Association

### Proposed dates (subject to confirmation)

19 – 23 August 2027

### Proposed venues

#### Kigali Convention Centre

The Kigali Convention Centre, which is the recommended venue for the World Scout Conference 2027, offers a premium facility for regional and international conferences, conventions, exhibitions, festivals, and cultural events. Standing alongside the adjoining 5-star, 292-room Radisson Blu Hotel, it is the most iconic and up-to-date convention centre in all of Africa. Kigali Convention Centre contains facilities to support both business and leisure. It is located eight minutes from Kigali International Airport. The centre spans more than 32,000 m<sup>2</sup> of net floor space and has a customisable exhibition area, with 17 versatile meeting rooms.

Some additional features of the convention centre include:

- A state-of-the-art auditorium which can host up to 4,500 delegates.
- Spacious pre-function areas located on different floors, ideal for hosting pre and post event gatherings.
- Modern technology and built-in AV equipment in all meeting spaces.
- VIP holding rooms.
- On-site health clinic.
- ATM (Automated Teller Machine).
- Around 650 free parking spaces for delegates.
- Restaurants, bar, and auditorium.
- One complimentary clinic room.
- State-of-the-art technology solutions and high-speed internet (dedicated internet upon request).

#### Visa process

Rwanda provides a straightforward visa process, with many nationalities eligible for visas on arrival or e-visas. Visa waivers apply to citizens of the African Union, Commonwealth, and Organisation International de la Francophonie countries. Non-exempt delegates can obtain visas on arrival for USD 50.

#### Official arrival points

Kigali International Airport will serve as the official arrival point. Reception and registration tents will be set up at the airport to facilitate smooth arrivals, registrations, and transfers. A team of protocol volunteers will be set up from the airport through to the registration booths and to the accommodation, to help facilitate all logistical arrangements.

Kigali International Airport is the main gateway to Rwanda, located about 5 km from Kigali's city centre and 7 km from the Kigali Convention Centre. Transport options may include:

- Organised transport for World Scout Conference 2027 participants.
- Safe taxis and hotel shuttles available for those in need.
- Car rentals available at the airport and across Kigali city.

Nyabugogo Taxi Park will serve as the official entry point for all international visitors entering Rwanda by roads from the neighbouring countries, namely Burundi, Tanzania, Kenya, the Democratic Republic of the Congo and others. In case there are participants arriving by road, some reception booths will be set up in the taxi park.

#### Accommodation

Kigali offers over 10,000 accommodation options. Some main hotels near the Kigali Convention Centre include:

- Radisson Blu: adjacent to Kigali Convention Centre, offering 292 rooms,
- Kigali Marriott Hotel: 4 km from Kigali Convention Centre, offering 254 rooms,
- Kigali Serena Hotel: 4 km from Kigali Convention Centre offering comprehensive services
- Four Points by Sheraton: 4 km from Kigali Convention Centre, offering 154 rooms
- Ubumwe Grande Hotel: 4 km from Kigali Convention Centre, offering modern amenities

Daily transport to the Kigali Convention Centre:

- Walking: Participants in nearby hotels can walk to the Kigali Convention Centre.
- Shuttle services: Provided by the event and hotels.
- Public transport: Buses and motorbike taxis are available.

- Taxis and ride-hailing services: YegoCabs and VW Move are available for safe transport.
- Car rentals and private cars: Ample parking is available at the Kigali Convention Centre

### Off-site programme

The programme will include networking, cultural exchange, plenary sessions, service projects, and outdoor activities. Additional activities will enhance the conference experience:

- Cultural excursions: Including tours of Kigali, and King’s Palace Museum.
- Environmental service activities: including tree planting, and community service.
- Adventure activities: Including gorilla trekking, and safaris.
- Networking events: Including welcome reception, and cultural night.
- Educational tours: Including visiting non-governmental organisations, innovation hubs, and universities.

### Reducing and controlling costs

- Visas are waived for all member states of the African Union, Commonwealth and Organisation Internationale de la Francophonie countries.
- The Government of Rwanda, through the Rwanda Convention Bureau already committed to offer a dry venue for duration of the Conference (in-kind support).
- Rwanda Convention Bureau commits to support our negotiation for a discount for up to 15% on air tickets for registered international delegates flying with Rwandair (the national carrier) and Qatar Airways (partner to Rwandair) from their 30 current destinations worldwide during the time of the Conference.
- Rwanda Convention Bureau commits to support our negotiation to get a discount of 15% on gorilla trekking permits for international delegates which are registered for the World Scout Conference 2027 and its connected programmes.
- Through partnerships and sponsorships, Rwanda Scouts Association will aim to secure other sources of funding to be able to maximize resources and control costs.

### Solidarity programme

The programme will target Member Organizations from low-income countries, and those facing financial barriers to participation. Representation for Member Organizations in category A will be supported through this programme, ensuring a broad and diverse representation of Member Organizations at the Conference. Financial assistance will include covering round-trip airfare to Kigali, Rwanda. Additionally, free or subsidised accommodation at designated hotels, including meals during the Conference, and waiving or significantly reducing Conference registration fees for selected participants will be provided. Funding sources will include donations, sponsorships, grants from international organisations, and contributions from well-wishers and Scout organisations worldwide.

### Risk management

A comprehensive approach will be taken, involving risk identification, assessment, mitigation planning, monitoring, and collaboration with authorities. Key risks include environmental, climate, security, and geopolitical factors.

### Minimising environmental impact

The event will prioritise sustainability through various measures:

- Venue selection: Kigali Convention Centre was ranked with sustainable practices.
- Transportation: Use of public transport, including green buses and low-emission shuttles.
- Waste management: Kigali Convention Centre and other identified hotels providing recycling programmes, minimising single-use plastics.
- Energy efficiency: Use of energy-efficient systems and renewable energy.
- Catering: Local and seasonal food sourcing and vegetarian options.
- Water conservation: Low flow faucets, and providing water conservation information.
- Carbon offset: Invest in reforestation and renewable energy projects.
- Digital materials: Use of event apps and online programmes.
- Community engagement: Support local environmental initiatives.
- Sustainability reporting: Monitor and report sustainability metrics.

By integrating these measures, the World Scout Conference 2027 aims to minimise environmental impact and set a benchmark for future events.

## United Kingdom – The Scout Association

### Proposed dates (subject to confirmation)

We propose to host the Conference in November 2027. This is an exciting time to be in the United Kingdom in the lead up to the festive season and provides separation from the 26th World Scout Jamboree being held in Poland in August 2027.

### Proposed venues

We would hold the Conference in London, which is a vibrant, multicultural and cosmopolitan city. It is both old and new, its ancient castle is right next to its newest skyscrapers. London's energy, as 8.8 million people go about their life, is tangible in every journey, whether on its extensive public transport network or a walk along the banks of the River Thames. It is one of the most diverse cities in the world with nearly 50% of residents from different backgrounds and 300 languages being spoken.

We are in discussion with two venues. This allows us to maintain a competitive tension to get a competitive price should we be the selected as Host. The two options are described below.

#### ExCel International Conference Centre

ExCel ICC is located on the east side of London and is a new building under construction as an extension of the existing ExCel Exhibition Centre. It is due to open in October 2024. The venue has two stations on the London Underground with the new Elizabeth line connecting directly to London Heathrow Airport. We would have sole access to the Conference part of this venue. The facilities are spread across two floors and can provide a large plenary hall with seating for up to 3,000 people, a large space for exhibitions and Scout shops, breakout rooms, meeting rooms for 10 to 200 delegates, and a flexible eating space that can cater to informal or formal dining.

#### London Olympia

Olympia is located on the west side of London. It is a mix of an established exhibition centre and a new building currently under construction and due to open in early 2026. Olympia was the site of the 1st World Scout Jamboree and Conference in 1920. The venue has a station located directly outside the main entrance providing connections into the London Underground system. The facilities are entered through a dedicated reception area connecting to the historic National Hall which can cater for 2,500+ people for the plenary sessions. There would be breakout spaces off the plenary area and a connection through to the new conference centre for meeting rooms, exhibitions, Scout shops and flexible areas for informal or formal dining.

### Official arrival points

London Heathrow and London Gatwick Airports together with the international Eurostar rail terminal at London St. Pancras International. Approximately 400 cities across the world have direct flight connections to Heathrow and Gatwick airports. These official arrival points all connect using public transport to either venue.

### Accommodation

Both venues have 2,500 hotel rooms within walking distance, ranging from budget to luxury. For those that wish to stay further away there are over 160,000 hotel rooms across London, and the public transport system connects directly to the venues.

### Off-site programme

We would arrange off-site trips and experiences both before and after the Conference to some of the historic Scouting locations around London, for instance Brownsea Island, the site of the first experimental Scout Camp in 1907, and to Gilwell Park, the home of Scout Training and the Wood Badge.

We would also arrange an accompanying person's programme around London and the surrounding area.

### Reducing and controlling costs

We are mindful that the Conference should be affordable. Measures we will take include:

- Maintaining venue options to allow us to negotiate the best deal should we be selected as Host.
- Working with WOSM to look at Conference duration. We propose five days.
- Working with WOSM to review the Conference scope to drive out any 'gold plating'.
- Maximising the use of public transport.
- Using virtual meetings as part of the preparation to minimise costs.
- Learning from the experience of the 43rd World Scout Conference in Egypt.

The Scout Association is used to running events to a tight budget and has financial systems that track expenditure.

### Estimated fees

Our target is that the fee should be no more than 10% higher than the fees for the 43<sup>rd</sup> World Scout Conference.

### Solidarity programme

We will work with WOSM to structure the fee and develop a solidarity fund so that all Member Organizations are able to attend the Conference. This would be advised to Member Organizations at least a year ahead of the Conference allowing plenty of time to make plans.

### Risk management

Risk management is embedded within The Scout Association's processes. We will set up and manage the process in conjunction with the World Scout Bureau team. Starting with a risk management workshop between The Scout Association and the World Scout Bureau, hosting the resulting risk documents on a shared platform and then having regular reviews of the risk and mitigants. Examples of high-level risks are:

### Minimising environmental impact

We have selected venues which have sustainability at heart. The redevelopment of their buildings is being constructed to the highest sustainable standards achieving "Excellent" rating through the Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Method. Both venues have committed to being carbon neutral, recycling waste with nothing going to landfill and using renewable energy. The venues have caterers that aim to source all their ingredients responsibly from local suppliers.

Travel has one of the largest impacts on the environment. London is extremely well connected to the rest of world via air travel or train with direct connections to over 400 international destinations. We expect attendees to be able to arrive on a direct flight reducing CO2 emissions. The public transport network links airports to the venues and accommodation reducing the need for vehicular traffic. The venues are within the London Ultra Low Emissions Zone. There is plenty of hotel accommodation within walking distance of the potential venues.

## 17th World Scout Moot (2029)

The [World Scout Moot](#) takes place every four years in a different country. It is an event for senior sections (traditionally called Rovers) and other young adult members, usually gathering up to 5,000 people. Moots provide an opportunity for young adults in Scouting to meet together and take part in activities that enable them to become active global citizens. Participants must be between the ages of 18 and 25 at the time of the event. Individuals who are 26 years or older can take part as International Service Team members.

The World Scout Committee approved to bring before the Conference the following Member Organization to bid for the 17<sup>th</sup> World Scout Moot (2029):

- Scouts of China – The General Association of the Scouts of China

## Scouts of China – The General Association of the Scouts of China

### Proposed dates (subject to confirmation)

30 July – 10 August 2029

### Proposed venue

#### Tsou Ma Lai Farm

- Geographic description: Tsou Ma Lai Farm is located in southern Taiwan at the Yujing District in Tainan City, at the exit of the Yujing Interchange of the No. 84 Expressway, with convenient transportation. The site is surrounded by the Zengwen river on three sides and the Wushan Ridge, a branch of Alishan Mountain, forming a landscape with abundant tourism resources.
- Size of the venue: The site covers an area of 120 hectares, of which 40 hectares are grassland. It is vast, magnificent and unique in Taiwan.
- Check-in and day visitor registration: Delegates will gather and check-in at Linkou Chang Gung Memorial University. The opening ceremony will be held at the Chiang Kai-shek Memorial Hall. Day visitor registration for basecamp will be located in the Tainan Station of the Taiwan high speed train.
- How to reach by international travel (airports, train stations):
  - For the check-in point: international flights arrive at Taiwan Taoyuan International Airport, there is an Airport Express at Terminal 1. Take the Airport Express and get off at Linkou Chang Gung Memorial Hospital Station.
  - To get to the basecamp: take the Airport Express from the airport to Taoyuan High Speed Rail Station, then take the Taiwan High Speed Rail and get off at Tainan High Speed Rail Station.

#### Official arrival points

Taiwan Taoyuan International Airport, and Linkou Chang Gung Memorial University.

### Educational objectives

The approach and goals outlined for the 2029 World Scout Moot demonstrate a strong emphasis on sustainable development, simple living, and youth empowerment. By incorporating the Scout method and principles into the event planning, the organisers aim to provide a transformative experience for the participating Scouts.

- Promise and Law: The event will begin by ensuring that all Scouts follow the Scout Promise and Law in their activities and camp life. This sets a common foundation and reinforces the values and principles of Scouting.
- Small group learning: Organisers recognise the importance of peer education and interaction among international groups. By using small group learning, Scouts can learn from each other and gain a global perspective, fostering cultural understanding and collaboration.
- Learning in nature and community service: Activities will emphasise learning in nature and engaging in community service. By providing practical experiences, the participants can develop an understanding of the relationship between humans, the environment, and society. These can lead to increased civic awareness and active participation in social activities. An important principle in organising the World Scout Moot is to adhere to the ISO 14001 (Environmental Management) standard. That means we will strive to minimise the event's negative impact on the environment through effective resource management, waste reduction, ensuring efficient use of water and energy, and other measures to ensure environmental sustainability.
- Experiential and contextual learning: The programme will provide Scouts with practical experiences and encourage them to reflect on their actions. By applying experiential and contextual learning theories, participants can gain insights that they can apply in their future endeavours. The aim is to encourage reflection and the practical application of learning.

### Proposed programme

The Moot programme shall consist of two essential parts: Expedition and Basecamp activities.

Participants will join International Patrols of 10 participants and spread out in different Expedition Centres around Taiwan. International Patrols will be formed some months before the event, and they will have time to get to know each other via social media. When they arrive in Taiwan, they will gather together for the Moot. The programme will begin with an opening gathering at the National Taiwan Sport University. From there, International Patrols will spend six days on trails around Taiwan- exploring nature, culture,

adventure, and community. Finally, all participants will come together at the Tsou Ma Lai Farm for the Basecamp activities.

During the Expedition section, there will be 6 Expedition Centres that serve as hubs for organising and coordinating various outdoor activities and adventures. Each centre will be strategically located in different regions of Taiwan, offering unique landscapes, natural wonders, and cultural attractions for participants to explore. Each Expedition Centre will have specific trails underneath it, offering appropriate programme modules for participants. The number of trails and the specific module combinations may vary depending on the Expedition Centre and its offerings. Then, all participants will come together at the Tsou Ma Lai Farm for four days of activities as part of the programme of the Basecamp Section.

### Reducing and controlling costs

To reduce and keep costs under control we will:

- We will look for support from local governments and councils for the sub-camp operation costs.
- Try to reduce the purchase of unnecessary items and use more recycled items, which can also save a lot of money. "Bare necessities."

### Solidarity programme

We are expecting to establish a solidarity fund for at least 30,000 USD. This solidarity fund will be able to support at least 50 young people from Category A and 30 young people from Category B.

Solidarity Operation programme details:

- As the Host we would look into providing camping equipment for Member Organizations under category A and B. The Host will also establish solidarity funds to support the participating fee for young people.
- The source of the fund would possibly be from government, private donors, partnership enterprises, and Member Organizations interested in contributing to the solidarity programme. We will conduct such programme in accordance with the relevant WOSM policies and guidelines.

## Risk management

The Moot will establish a control center to monitor the entire event, closely collaborating with relevant government agencies. We will develop vertical and horizontal communication channels with nearby hospitals, police stations, fire departments, and other relevant entities. The Host Committee will provide comprehensive crisis management plans which will be developed to ensure the smooth progress of the event and the safety of all participants.

### Minimising environmental impact

We aim to achieve the highest level of sustainability in terms of sustainable development by applying the principles of sustainable event management, adhering to the ISO 20121 (Sustainability Management) standard, and focusing on social impact and economic benefits. These include reducing energy consumption, waste generation, and carbon footprint, providing sustainable transportation options, selecting eco-friendly food, promoting local economic development, and ensuring the long-term well-being of participants and the community. We strive to ensure that the activities of the World Scout Moot achieve sustainability in terms of the environment, society, and economy.

To minimise the environmental impact of the event, we aim to:

- Reduce plastic use: Opt for reusable containers and utensils to avoid single-use plastic products. For example, use stainless steel water bottles and reusable utensils to reduce plastic waste.
- Waste management: Provide clear waste sorting points and encourage participants to dispose of garbage properly. Also, ensure that all waste is handled correctly, including recycling.
- Energy and water conservation: Encourage water conservation and energy efficiency, such as saving water when washing dishes or taking showers in areas far from water sources.
- Environmental education: Conduct environmental education during the event to raise participants' awareness of the importance of nature conservation and provide information on sustainable living practices.
- Choose eco-friendly equipment: Opt for environmentally friendly camping gear and supplies, such as biodegradable cleaning products, solar chargers, etc., to reduce the impact on nature.

## 27th World Scout Jamboree (2031)

The [World Scout Jamboree](#) takes place every four years in a different country. It is the largest regular event organised by WOSM, usually gathering up to 40,000 people from all over the world. It is above all an educational event to promote peace and understanding. The World Scout Jamboree includes a wide variety of activities to develop new skills, learn about different cultures, and build friendships through unique camping experience. Participants must be between the ages of 14 and 17 at the time of the event. Individuals who are 18 years or older can take part as International Service Team members.

The World Scout Committee approved to bring before the Conference the following Member Organizations to bid for the 27<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree (2031):

- Alliance: Bangladesh, Ecuador, Egypt, Kenya, United States of America - representing the Bangladesh Scouts, Asociación de Scouts del Ecuador, Egyptian Scout Federation, The Kenya Scouts Association, Boy Scouts of America
- Denmark – The Danish Scout Council

## Alliance – Bangladesh, Ecuador, Egypt, Kenya, United States of America

We are the Alliance, we are representing the Asociación de Scouts del Ecuador, Egyptian Scout Federation, The Kenya Scouts Association, Bangladesh Scouts, and Boy Scouts of America.

Early August 2031

### Proposed venue

#### Summit Bechtel Reserve High Adventure Base

Description of location:

The Summit Bechtel Reserve

Surrounded by beautiful, mature, indigenous chestnut, tamarack, and hemlock trees on rolling hills at the tail end of the Appalachian Mountains, the site is striking to the eye and completely isolated from city sounds and lights. Enormous land "benches" created by decades of mining in the area provide excellent natural flatlands for campsites and activities.

Geographic description:

Situated in the wilds of West Virginia, the Summit Bechtel Reserve (located at 2550 Jack Furst Drive, Mount Hope, WV 25880, 37.91° N, -81.11° E) sits in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains. This rocky chain of hills is approximately 460 million years old and is home to the oldest mountains in the world. The range stretches from Newfoundland, Canada, to Alabama, USA.

Size of venue:

The entire Summit Bechtel Reserve comprises more than 14,000 acres, including 10,600 acres of contiguous property, a welcome centre on 600 acres along U.S. Highway 19, and 2,900 acres located among eight properties along the New River.

Location of check-in and day visitor registration:

The Ruby Welcome Centre. A 600-acre site located on U.S. Highway 19.

Reaching by international travel:

Airports that can be used to arrive at the Summit Bechtel reserve are the same as in 2019. They include but are not limited to: Charleston WV, Dulles, Washington National, Baltimore Washington International, Pittsburgh, Lexington, Charlotte, Atlanta, Cincinnati.

### Official arrival points

Arrival points will be determined after discussions with major air carriers. It is our intention to have the arrival points as close to the Jamboree as practical.

### Educational objectives

Our educational objectives have established the framework to create a jamboree where lifelong friendships will be made; Scouts will become world citizens; and we will memorialise that we are the largest Youth Movement in the World for Peace. All of this through the theme "Connecting Cultures".

- Make and celebrate new friendships developed during the World Scout Jamboree. The experiences at the Jamboree will provide opportunities for Scouts from different Member Organizations to make strong personal connections with each other. Shared experiences will deepen relationships between and among both individuals and patrols. International Service Team members likewise will have the opportunity to develop friendships and the foundation for lifelong relationships through the work and recreational opportunities available during the Jamboree.
- Interact with and understand new cultures. As Jamboree participants build friendships and relationships with one another, intentional experiences built into the Jamboree programme will ensure that every participant learns about the culture of other Jamboree experiences. The depth of interaction will ensure that all participants will understand culture as more than just cultural expressions (clothing, dress, food, dance, etc.). They will gain insight into more fundamental culture values (beliefs about right and wrong, about justice, etc.), and how the Scout Promise and Scout Law provide a common bond among all participants present at the Jamboree.
- Prepare to contribute to world peace and understanding as active global citizens. Through explicitly designed experiences, Jamboree participants will learn how positive and constructive dialogue promotes effective communication, common understanding, and a deeper appreciation of new perspectives. As Jamboree participants have their perspectives expanded and enriched, they will commit to doing their best as they prepare for a lifetime guided by the values of the

Scout Promise and Scout Law, working together for a global common good—and creating a better world long after they have departed the Jamboree.

### **Proposed programme**

The Alliance has developed some key programme elements that will be reflective of our theme and educational objectives. Because we are a broad-based coalition, we will be actively soliciting input and leadership from each Region of WOSM. This will make sure that we have fully integrating programme elements that are valuable for our youth and align with the Jamboree's educational objectives. The list below is just the start of what we have in store.

Here are some programme areas that reflect our educational objectives:

- Regional days – A day of the Jamboree dedicated to each of WOSM's Regions. Learning about the cultures, food and Scouting from each of the Regions. These will be developed in partnership with each Region.
- International camp - A section of the Jamboree where Scouts can experience a curated programme with other Scouts from around the world for a 24-hour period. This will foster a deeper understanding of cultures while creating the ability to make lifelong friends.
- International Passport – A programme where each participant will be able to tour the Jamboree on their own, and meet with Scouts from other countries and cultures, and get their Jamboree-issued "Passport" stamped.
- Peace day – An entire day devoted to education, thoughtfulness and dialogue about Peace. Culminated in all participants signing a Peace Pledge.
- Model UN – Through discussion, negotiation, and debate, Scouts from around the world work together to find solutions to global problems.

Other programme activities that the Summit can provide will include:

- Aquatics, which includes kayaking, scuba, stand up paddle board, team stand up paddle board, water obstacle course and white-water rafting.
- Aerial sports programme, which consists of the Big Zip, the Canopy, Gateway and Legacy Zip, and the Ropes.
- Climbing, which includes the largest manmade outdoor climbing facility in the world, consisting of 125 climbing stations, 100 bouldering stations, 42 rappelling stations, and the Leap of Faith.
- Extreme sports, which will feature BMX biking, mountain biking, and skateboarding.
- Shooting sports, which includes rifle, pistol, shotgun and archery.
- Frontier experience where participants will be able to experience life in the American frontier.
- Brownsea Island where participants will be able to experience Scouting on Brownsea island.

There will be other programmes like Faith and Beliefs, Global Development, and other areas what will be developed in consultation with WOSM and partners.

### **Reducing and controlling costs**

It is our intention, once we are awarded the bid, to seek out sponsors and organizations that can help support the Jamboree with funds, goods and services. Because we currently represent 4 of the 5 WOSM Regions this will be a global activity. We will start our efforts with multinational corporations, many that are headquartered in the US. These efforts will be only one part of a stringent cost containment programme that will be established. This programme will include transparent bidding for goods and services with cost containment in mind. The Alliance leadership understands the cost to each participant to attend and we are committed to controlling costs.

### **Estimated fees**

We, the Alliance, believe that it is not realistic to establish any fee structure this far away from any event. There are too many variables that can affect costs. As we mentioned prior, we intend to have a robust operation seeking sponsorships and underwriting costs. All the Alliance partners know firsthand that the cost of events will shape its size and quality. We are committed to having a fee structure that will take this into consideration.

### **Solidarity programme**

The solidarity programme will fund 3% of the budget, with a fundraising goal of 10%. The Alliance will also take an equal share of any profits and use them to establish a fund in the World Scout Foundation as a permanent source for solidarity operations.

Details of the solidarity programme will be determined after the awarding of the bid. We will look at previous operations and consult with WOSM to implement the most impactful programme possible.

## Risk management

The Summit Bechtel Reserve is a Scouting America High Adventure Base. It must comply with all Local, State and Federal Rules and Regulations. It must also comply with the Boy Scouts of America National Camp Accreditation Programme (NCAP) which certifies camps for operation. A copy of the NCAP standards Scouting America utilises has been provided to WOSM. The facilities undertake a visitation process annually. Annual capital improvements are considered, and regular maintenance schedules are in place for all facilities. As one of the premier youth programme facilities in the world, the Summit has a full-time year-round staff and management team. In addition to the 2019 World Scout Jamboree, the Summit is the permanent site of Boy Scouts of America's National Jamboree and is the fourth high adventure base of the Boy Scouts of America hosting thousands of young people every summer.

## Minimising environmental impact

The Alliance has made sustainability a priority by choosing the Summit. The Bechtel Summit Reserve is accredited by WOSM as a Scout Centre of Excellence for Nature Environment and Sustainability. Moreover, by also using an existing site the Alliance is not creating a larger carbon footprint by creating the Jamboree site and then destroying it after the event.

The Summit and the Alliance will be diligent in lowering the environmental impact. The Summit continues to increase and improve its wind and solar generating, grey water systems and recycling efforts.

## Denmark – The Danish Scout Council

### Proposed dates (subject to confirmation)

Our proposal is for the 27<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree to last 12 days from 28 July 2031 to 8 August 2031.

### Proposed venue

The proposed venue is Silkeborg Municipality.

Venue size: Approximately 500 hectares.

Terrain: Flat/small hills, agriculture land with areas with trees and bushes.

Nature: Green pastures and fields, surrounded by forested areas and lakes.

Silkeborg is situated in the Danish Lake Highlands, surrounded by lakes, hills, and Denmark's largest forest area. The city and municipality are known as the "Outdoor Capital" of Denmark and offer numerous opportunities for outdoor sports and recreation, like mountain biking, high rope adventure, outdoor obstacle courses, canoeing and kayaking. The municipality and local community have a strong tradition for organising cultural and sporting events with strong and meaningful involvement of citizens and businesses.

### Transport and entry points

Silkeborg is just 35 minutes from Aarhus (Denmark's second largest city) and 60 minutes from Billund Airport, connected by motorways and railways. Copenhagen International Airport (Kastrup) is 3,5 hours away by car, bus, or train, and Silkeborg is easily accessible via the national railway system. Copenhagen International Airport offers direct flights to major European and intercontinental airports, including key destinations in Asia, Africa, and the Americas.

### Educational objectives

Our bid aims to create a fun, activity-based, educational programme using Scouting's global influence to promote unity, peace, ethical technology, and nature regeneration. We wish to create opportunities for all participants to learn and develop as Scouts and individuals. We will do so by providing a framework for learning by doing, while having a great time, reflecting the Danish spirit of combining non-formal education with enjoyment, emphasising leadership, team spirit, and the power of collective action. Our three pillars of impact are:

**Create** is about the power of taking action. It is the entrepreneurial, explorative, and creative theme. Participants will practice how to use methods for social entrepreneurship to make a sustained positive difference in the communities they belong to, on both local and global levels. *Create* will motivate each participant to build their own action plan for positive change, that will reach further than the World Scout Jamboree.

**Influence** is about Scouting as the world's leading educational youth movement. Young people learn leadership, decision-making, and accountability, and they gain confidence in themselves, while feeling heard and valued. *Influence* will enable participants to develop self-confidence, be strong advocates, and create positive change in society. It focuses on leadership, advocacy skills, and being role models.

**Volunteer** is about the impact of volunteering and how it is often overlooked, but Scouting shows its power. In the *Volunteer* theme, participants will learn to value, take pride in, and promote volunteering. They will work together bridging cultures, building empathy, skills, and friendships while setting an example for society. It is about building capacity in our young people to organise and manage volunteers.

### Proposed programme

The programme for the 27<sup>th</sup> World Scout Jamboree in Denmark will be built on the three pillars: Create - Influence - Volunteer under the overarching theme "Amplifying Our Impact". Within those three pillars focus will be on fun, engaging activities across five areas 1) Peaceful living, 2) Health, 3) Sustainability, 4) Responsible technology, and 5) Thriving communities. Key elements include e.g. impact projects, reflections, hackathons, leadership training, and digital connectivity. The goal is to empower our young people as leaders, innovators, and global citizens. We aim to challenge them to solve problems and be part of shaping the solution. As advocates for inclusivity, we prioritise accessibility for all individuals, aligning with the values commonly practiced in Denmark. Our commitment ensures that everyone, regardless of ability, can participate fully in the camp and its activities.

Key elements will be the Scout method and youth leadership, meaning that activities will be fun and adventurous, but with an additional focus on deeper learning and gaining of skills. Activities will actively engage the participants in problem-based learning, where they get to work in patrols, take on responsibility

and solve issues by learning by doing. Thematic days, such as for example Cultural Day, will be an important part of the programme to ensure participants develop and get new experiences across cultures and communities.

### Reducing and controlling costs

It is crucial for us to make sure everyone can afford to participate. We are actively seeking financial support from the government and corporations, and this includes partnering with donors and foundations, to put less stress on the fees and internal finances, and also boosting the solidarity fund.

### Estimated fees

The estimated participation fees are based on past Jamboree costs per participant, adjusted for inflation. We consider the importance of keeping costs credible for hosting the 27th World Scout Jamboree in 2031. However, due to global economic uncertainty, it's hard to determine fees accurately now. The final calculation will be updated four years before the Jamboree and approved by the World Scout Committee in 2027.

### Solidarity programme

Our ambition is to allocate up to 10 percent of our budget to a solidarity programme, focusing on donor programmes, fundraising, and tailored economic support. This programme aims to manage costs effectively while ensuring inclusivity and accessibility for all participants. For the 27th World Scout Jamboree, we prioritise support for those with limited resources, aiming to have all NSOs represented at the World Scout Jamboree in Denmark. Collaboration with WOSM ensures efficient management, overseen by the World Scout Bureau. We propose forming a fundraising team to engage Danish and European foundations and corporate sponsors for support, including camp equipment. Denmark's unique donor environment with major companies structured around foundations, facilitates significant annual charity donations. Building on Scouting's history of collaboration with foundations in Denmark, we aim to establish a robust solidarity programme.

### Risk management

To bolster the risk management process, we'll establish a qualified risk management committee. This committee will meticulously oversee risk management at every step of event planning, ensuring transparency and accountability. We'll maintain seamless communication between Jamboree management, the World Scout Committee, and the World Scout Bureau, providing regular updates on progress. A stringent peer-review system will be implemented to thoroughly evaluate identified risks and assess organizational readiness.

#### Minimising environmental impact

The 27th World Scout Jamboree in Denmark will aim for 100% green energy to be used at the camp. Denmark is at the forefront of renewable energy solutions, and we will make use of these options at the World Scout Jamboree. While building on the current Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), we will also ensure:

- The site will be linked to the public supply/disposal of water, electricity and wastewater, minimising use of stand-alone solutions like diesel generators and sewage tanks etc.
- To integrate environmental responsibility into camp operations, focusing on waste sorting, green energy, wastewater purification, CO2-neutral heating, and promoting a circular economy.
- Camp materials will be ethically sourced, and no new permanent buildings will be constructed.
- By hosting the 27th World Scout Jamboree in cooperation with the Danish National Jamboree in 2030, we will minimise environmental impact and prioritise sustainability.
- We will collaborate with environmental organizations to stay updated on best practices and explore carbon offsetting options.
